

SALISBURY NH CEMETERIES

OAK HILL CEMETERY S02-006

LOCATION: Route 4 to Oak Hill Road on right at Salisbury Heights.

Cemetery in on the right up hill. Open access

According to John Dearborn in the History of Salisbury regarding the public cemetery Oak Hill Cemetery: It embraces 2 acres of land and was purchased of Benjamin Pettingill, in November 1868, by the following gentlemen:

BAPTIST GRAVEYARD /CENTER ROAD GRAVEYARD (Salisbury Heights) S02-008

LOCATION: On Route 4 north to Salisbury Heights community, town common area. On left behind Old Baptist Church. Good Condition and access.

"The Center Road, or Baptist cemetery, was laid out at the time of the building of the church, in 1791. Previous to that time, the people in this neighborhood buried their dead in the field east of F.W. Fifiel's house. The land was given by Able Elkins. The oldest stone is that of Rhoda, wife of Reuben True, and daughter of Gov. Josiah Bartlett, 1794- Here are buried the Sawyers, Fifiel's, Pettengill's, Webster's, and Adamses."-John Dearborn, The History of Salisbury 1890



Note: The house referenced as the F.W. Fifiel House may be the Hattan House across the road and down several houses from the Church. Since 1775 and the first owner Joseph Fifiel, several generations and families of Fifiel's have owned the house and several were named Frederick however none were named Frederick W. Fifiel according to Paul Shaw's Historical Houses Salisbury Houses.

Another consideration is that between 1775 and 1790 the Fifiel brothers built 4 homes. More research is needed on the location of the original burial ground in the fields mentioned by Dearborn.
